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Hello and welcome to my newsletter!

Brexit continues to dominate the headlines and, given it is the biggest set of interlocked problems facing the country in three generations, shows no sign of abating. Meanwhile, your Labour MEPs in the European Parliament are as busy as ever. This newsletter will keep party members up to date with my own activities in the Parliament, in the region and in London where, as Leader of the Labour MEPs, I attend Shadow Cabinet and the NEC. I will also share my thoughts on the latest chaotic twists and turns of the Brexit negotiations.

Brexit

Brexit negotiations with the EU have been stalled. Instead, Theresa May has had to spend her time negotiating with the various factions of her party. Despite locking all her cabinet ministers in Chequers without their phones for almost 12 hours in order to try to get agreement on her latest fudge, she failed, with David Davis and Boris Johnson resigning within the next two days, as did several junior ministers. Far from being a "soft" Brexit, as Boris Johnson claimed, the Chequers proposal would cut Britain's service sector out of the European single market, hitting the economy and losing countless jobs. Services amount to 80% of the UK economy and are also vital for manufacturing where post-sales services of products like aircraft engines and computer equipment are part of the value added. The "customs arrangement" proposal would involve imposing huge bureaucracy on our exporters. The package amounts to saying to the EU:

"We're leaving, so we want you to change your whole system to cater for us after we've left" - hardly a strong negotiating position!

March for a People's Vote

I was impressed by the turnout of over 100,000 people - including several groups from Yorkshire - at the demonstration in London on 23 June to demand that the final Brexit deal, when we have one, be put to a vote of the British people. The government has been reluctant to even let Parliament have a vote on the deal. Given that it is likely that the deal will be very different to what was promised by the Leave campaign and by Brexit ministers, forcing it through without scrutiny or approval would be an outrage.



There was an extraordinary turn-out at the People's March last month, amid increasing demand for a vote on the final deal.
